Fairfax is home to the Northern Virginia Jewish Community's eruv, a ritual enclosure of geographically contiguous neighborhoods to facilitate community sharing and activities otherwise prohibited on Shabbat.

The eruv project is managed by the Fairfax Eruv Committee, a nonprofit organization and exempt organization (Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code), incorporated in the State of Virginia, and is supported by the Jewish Federation of Greater Washington, and members of the local community.

Mazel Tov to 5784 Eruv Honoree, Erica Statman

Erica has been an eruv inspector since the eruv's establishment. When asked about her interest in the eruv, Erica says, "I feel strongly about supporting the Fairfax Eruv, not only because it helps to bring friends, family, and community members together on Shabbat and chagim, but also because it supports Jewish diversity and unity in Northern Virginia."



Erica has lived in Fairfax, VA for 25 years, and she met and married her husband, Michael, at Chabad of Fairfax 21 years ago. Erica and Michael have two children, Yosef and Chaya, and a dog, Zusha.

In addition to serving as an eruv inspector, Erica has served as a mikvah attendant for the women of Northern Virginia for the last ten years. Erica is a board-certified Diplomate in Pediatrics and Pregnancy care through the International Chiropractors Association and Palmer University. 


<u>Fun facts about Eruvim</u>: the Fairfax Eruv consists of hundreds of "doorways" utilizing existing infrastructure, like utility poles and power lines.



How is an Eruv "built"?

- Eruvs in modern times typically utilize existing utility infrastructure (e.g., power lines, telecom cables, highway sound walls).
- Eruvs can often utilize existing infrastructure without any attachments. We are utilizing over 500 poles across the region for the Eruv in their "as is" status.
- Most area utility poles have a center power line that passes directly over the pole itself – the concept of a lintel resting on doorposts – a key Eruv requirement. Our Eruv consists of hundreds of doorways.
